Epic survival of world's 'unluckiest penguins'

After a colony of penguin chicks were trapped by an iceberg that broke off from Antarctica earlier this year, scientists feared the worst. But these death-defying birds weren't going down without a fight!

Ice breaker

The shifting iceberg separated the baby birds from their mothers, which were out hunting for food. The iceberg was 15 metres high, meaning that the penguins could not climb over it.



BUILD YOUR KNOWLEDGE

Global warming is causing ice to melt in Antarctica. This threatens the species which live there by changing their habitats. Against the odds, these penguins chicks survived a huge iceberg that separated them from their mothers — and scientists can't work out how!

This penguin colony was already under threat.
Due to climate change, the sea ice that it lives on has become less stable.

Peng-win

Scientists watching this happen feared the worst. "I was dreading seeing that there wouldn't be anything there at all," said Peter Fretwell of the British Antarctic Survey.

But against the odds, these courageous chicks survived! How they survived remains a mystery, but Peter

thinks the penguins might have dived underneath the iceberg.

Slippery slope

Scientists warn that the penguins are still in danger due to climate change.

Global warming can cause Antarctic ice to melt, which is dangerous for penguins that are too young to swim.

"If your habitat changes then it's never good," says Peter Fretwell. These brave birds could soon find themselves in need of another miracle.
