Turtley awesome! Scientists save a species

Ever feel like you're getting old? Well, the Caretta caretta loggerhead sea turtle has been around for 100 million years and scientists want to make sure that it is here to stay!

A sturtle-ing resurgence

For a long time, scientists were worried that this incredible species might become extinct as its numbers fell.

But after 25 years of conservation efforts, the Greek island of Zakynthos

is now home to a record number of Caretta caretta hatchlings!

Save the turtles!

This success story is the result of joint efforts by Greek leaders and conservationists.

The Greek government has created a marine park on Zakynthos to protect the turtles. Campaigners have also raised awareness of the dangers that tourism creates for turtles. Now, there are over 10,000 new turtle nests per year in Greece!

Aquatic ambitions

Campaigning organisations such as the Mediterranean Association to Save the Sea Turtles (Medasset) are expanding their ambitions. They are working to protect turtles in other countries such as Turkey, Syria and Lebanon.

But they also warn that tourism is still a danger. "The threats are still very much there, and it could all so easily unravel," said Nadia Andreanidou of Medasset.
