In our Wild Cities competition, we asked young people to think about how cities can work better for people and nature.

Competition winner Alexa designed a new "Pocket City" using LEGO® bricks! She designed the city to be totally walkable, so that there would be less need for cars.

"My idea helps our planet along with all the living creatures by ensuring everything can be accessible by walking," she explained.

To take one example, Aayan designed an incredible green space to replace a road in front of Wimbledon Police Station. Aayan's park includes a swimming pool, fun and games for all, and plenty of room to cycle.
